Working with the DS, each church can call a church or charge conference for this work. A *charge* conference is the basic governing body of the local church and is comprised of the church council (administrative board or leadership team) and all retired clergy within the local church, while a *church* conference invites broader participation with all members having the right to attend and vote. Pastors are invited to consult with their DS to determine the appropriate conference setting for each context (charge conference, church conference, multiple point charges in one unified or multiple meetings, or a circuit conference, etc.).

Senior Pastor Report Rev. Laura Rainwater

Greetings, church! I have learned throughout the years that church conference reports are historical documents. There have been many times I have looked at previous packets to learn (or remember) what happened during a particular year. Please read all of this year's reports and may they tell our church's story for 2023.

The year started with the challenging news that a new church was starting in Parker, and it was being led by a former Parker UMC pastor. In November 2022, the Leadership Board voted to stay United Methodist as we did not have a majority to make any changes to our denominational affiliation. Several church members were not happy with this decision, so we were not surprised that they began attending this new church.

What church leadership discovered during this process is that some church members had already begun to withdraw their support – both in participation and financial – before January 2023. What I heard from many of you is this was painful as your church friends left our church. We know that our church has gone through similar situations in the past. Yet, we trust that we will continue to serve our Lord as a faithful community the best we can, even as we process the resulting grief.

In the spring the Leadership Board prayerfully focused on discovering our church's vision, mission, and values. I thank each board member for their work during this process. I also give thanks for each of you who gave us your feedback. Here are our new vision, mission, and values:

Vision: To be a beacon of Christ-centered hope for our neighbors

Mission: We are a Christ-centered community where you belong, you grow, you make a difference.

Values: Being Spirit-filled, Christ-Centered, Faithful, Welcoming, Loving, Supportive, Engaged, In Service, In Community

We are already using these statements to let our community know we are a place where all are welcome to belong, grow, and make a difference. We hope you all share this with others as well.

Belong

People find opportunities to belong through worship, classes, small groups, and membership.

Worship continues to be an important part of our church experience. Our 2 services provide different opportunities to worship. Our 9 am service is more traditional and our 10:30 am Spark! Service is geared toward children and families, though anyone is welcome for a more experiential time of worship. We also continue to livestream our 9 am service both on YouTube and umcparker.online.church. We consistently have 35-50 people online during worship, and another 100-150 views later during the week. Online worship is helpful for those who are traveling or who are ill. It

is also a new *front-door* where visitors check us out before they come to our church building. We are grateful for those who help make this a wonderful experience.

Our worship/sermon series in 2023 included: the book of 1 Corinthians; Honest Questions for a Deeper Faith; Questions for God; Songs for the Road; Movies with a Message: The People of God Who Do No Harm, Do Good, Attend to the Ordinances of God; Parker UMC – Vision, Mission, Values, Calling; Giving of Ourselves; the Book of Ruth; and, An Unlikely Advent.

Another opportunity for worship and belonging is our At the Table dinner church one Wednesday each month. This has become a small group in many ways. This is also one way some, especially families, check out our church for the first time.

We continue to offer small groups and classes where people can connect with one another. I will share more below as we discuss how these help us all grow in our faith.

Our membership continues to grow as well. We have had more people join the church than leave the church this year. This is a great sign that God is doing something through us and people are excited to join in! We continue to have people check out our church online as well as visit in person for worship. Thank you to those who extend a hospitable welcome to our visitors.

Grow

There are many ways people can grow in their faith and in discipleship. We offer classes and small groups for everyone.

- For our children, we offer Sunday school class, Children's Choir, Preteen group, and other fun events.
- For our youth, we have Sunday school class, Confirmation class, Youth group, and other fun events.
- For those interested in music and fine arts, you can join the Chorale, Cambiata, Hand Bell Ringers, and other opportunities to perform.
- We have United Methodist Men and United Women in Faith groups and activities for our men and women.
- We have at least three adult Sunday school classes each week, and sometimes an extra one focusing on a specific topic for a period of time.
- We have Bible studies and book studies that are both ongoing and periodic.
- There are dinner groups, other fellowship groups, and even a gardening group for people to grow in their faith and in community.
- We also offer groups for parents of young children. Some of these groups are geared toward those in our Little Blessings Preschool and Kindergarten.

I am grateful for all who provide leadership for these many groups. This is how we are invited to grow in discipleship.

Make a Difference

These classes and small groups not only help people belong and grow, but also make a difference.

- Consider our knitting ministries that provide items for our community, especially during the cold weather.
- Our women's groups provide prayer and support various mission projects.
- Our caring ministry invites members to help support others with meals, cards, phone calls, etc., especially during difficult times.
- We continue to support Parker Task Force and SECOR Cares who provide assistance to those in need in our community.
- We have a new Missions Team that is working to determine how we already share our time and gifts for mission projects both near and far.
- We continue to support various ministries both local and global.
- Our youth group went on a mission trip to help in Arkansas.
- Once again we collected backpacks and school supplies for our community schools.
- Many of you helped around the building pulling weeds, mowing the lawn, cleaning things up, and helping whenever we asked.
- You volunteer in a variety of ways.
- We continue to make financial donations to relief organizations across the globe.

I KNOW I haven't captured all of the ways we give.

Every time you give, every time you volunteer, every time you pray during these opportunities, you are making a difference.

I am grateful for your generosity. You truly are serving Christ in our community each and every day!

Check out the other reports to learn more about our various ministries. We continue to offer opportunities to bless the community with some of our activities, meals, and fun events.

Looking to 2024, we will continue to live into our vision and mission while exhibiting our values. I invite each of us to prayerfully discern how we are partnering with God in our community. Are we welcoming and loving in all we do? Do we strive to be Spirit-filled and Christ-centered when living our lives and making decisions? Share your thoughts with me, with one of our staff, and with one another. Together we continue to be the hands, feet, and heart of Christ in our world, both near and far.

Associate Pastor Cody Anderson's Report

Student Ministries

This year was a transition year for our youth program as our Director of Student Ministries, Anne Marie Webb, left in July for another position. Under her direction for the first half of the year, we celebrated a new confirmand class, celebrated our graduating seniors, and had a successful mission trip to Little Rock, Arkansas. 15 youth and 4 adults drove across the country to work with Ozark Missions, building wheelchair ramps for families in need, and getting to know other youth from around the country. During the summer, the youth group met at people's homes for Bible and BBQ, building stronger connections within the group

In mid-July, Pastor Cody Anderson took over the student ministries program. The first months were spent doing surveys and having conversations, listening to what the youth and their parents loved about our youth program and what they would like to see in the future. Conversations were also had with the congregation and an invitation to help with the youth program in a variety of ways. This fall, we have been rebuilding our student ministry, focusing on building community, introducing youth/parent family meals to discuss a variety of topics, and working together in mission and service opportunities. We had 40 parents and youth help pack meals at Lifeline Christian Mission and discussed how we grow in our faith through serving others. We are hoping to provide more opportunities for service and have invitation spaces for others to come and join us. We have a small confirmation class that has been meeting and growing in their faith since September and will continue to meet through March. And we have many new adults helping out with our youth program, mostly focused on teaching Sunday School.

We continue to dream about the future for our youth program, listening to the needs of our youth and our community, and thinking about what we can do to continue to grow.

Community Connections

This year, Pastor Cody Anderson has been focused on working with community partners, hearing the needs in our community, and then trying to bridge what she learns with what the strengths of our community are. She has attended monthly Douglas County Homeless Initiative meetings, Community Cares meetings, occasional Rotary meetings, and individual meetings with the Department of Human Services, the Douglas County Health Board, the Family Resource Center, and others. Currently, there is a huge need for families in our community who are looking for not only financial resources, but also for parenting resources. While there are resources readily available for families in Castle Rock and Highlands Ranch, there is a huge need in the Parker area. In the coming year, we would like to explore what it would mean for us to partner with these organizations and create something that could help the families in Parker.

Hospitality

Our hospitality team continues to grow, working hard to make Sunday mornings a warm and hospitable space for new people to come in and feel welcome, as well as creating space for our regulars to be able to connect with one another. There has been a new focus and energy to create a hospitable space, and a team has started to meet to think about how we can do that in new exciting ways. In the coming year, there will be more discussions, trainings and education about how important hospitality is to the life of the church.

New Ministries

At The Table- At The Table continues to be a wonderful space for connection and mission. We continue to average 40 people every month, mostly new people within the congregation looking to get connected. Mission moments have included packing backpacks for students of need in our

community, packing manna bags to hand out to our unhoused neighbors, and creating thank you notes for our Little Blessings preschool teachers and staff. monthly dinner worship experience started up in February called At The Table and has been a successful space for people to worship in a completely different way. Next year, we are hoping to get more of our seasoned members to join us At The Table and make meaningful connections with those who are new to Parker UMC.

Spark! Spark! continues to be a wonderful option for people to come and worship in a new way. We have grown into the service, and people have made strong connections, making it a consistent worship space for many. Families love this service because they connect with each other and their children are happy to be in the worship space. Children love to play with one another, do crafts with Miss Noelle, and collect money for missions for the noisy offering. And youth help serve communion as well as help with children who need a little extra love. Prayer is a special time in the service where we practice a variety of different ways to pray, including sharing outloud those things that we are worried about or are celebrating. We have seen people in this space who have never attended church, and it is a wonderful entry space into church. We average about 55 people in worship, and have seen it grow in the last few months. We hope to build on this service, gathering more of our preschool families to worship with us, and provide space for anyone who doesn't fit the traditional mold of worship.

Online Worship

We continue to provide online worship space and average about 15 people joining in conversation on Sunday mornings, and about 100 people who watch throughout the week. People who are homebound from illness, surgeries, or other reasons appreciate the space to be able to worship with others, and visitors continue to worship online as an entry into our faith community. Along with online worship, we continue to provide weekly online devotions that have about 45 views a week and provide another space for people to connect, grow in their faith, and to be able to share with others. We also are focusing on having more social media outreach, providing prayer moments and scripture readings for people to reflect on throughout their week.

Pastor Cody's Reflections

It has been a year of rebirth and growth in our congregation. It has been hard to lose many familiar faces, and there has been grief that has come with that. And it also has been a year of new beginnings, new energy, new ministries, and new people. I continue to meet with visitors over coffee and tea, learning that many who come to worship with us are searching for a space of community where they can connect and grow in their faith, and a faith community that is seeking to be a place of open hearts, open minds, and open doors. And those who continue to come have found a space for connection, bringing with them their gifts and talents to help us during this season. I appreciate their leadership, their new ideas, and the ways that they are excited to get involved.

Within this new space, I have been working to offer new classes and opportunities for connection and growth in their faith. During Lent, I led two new classes, including one that was a way to explore Lent through art. We had a variety of artists come and share their talents, teaching those in the class about their medium, and helping us reflect on our faith in a new way. And this fall, I led a couple of parenting classes, including Parenting With Love and Logic, offering resources to our Little Blessings families and our church families and helping parents get connected with one another.

I continue to help lead worship and enjoy being able to preach as well as to be a part of special services. Parking lot ashes on Ash Wednesday, providing Ash Wednesday worship for our Little Blessings students, and working the parking lot for the 4th of July are always fun events for me as we get to interact with so many community people. I also continue to work closely with Little Blessings, partnering with them as they continue their work with children and their families in our community.

It has been a year of growth for me. I have attended many new classes, including getting certified in Mental Health and First Aid, and being a part of a Fresh Expressions Cohort, dreaming about what new ministries we can do beyond our church walls. Late this fall, we applied for a grant to help provide mental health training for our congregation members, and we are hoping to be able to offer that this coming year. And next year, I am hoping to create a few new faith spaces out in the community, reaching out to those in our community who might not feel comfortable entering in the church doors.

I have enjoyed going back to my roots and working with youth again. They have an infectious energy and it has been fun for me to get to know them, to ask them questions, and to learn about the ways that they see faith and the church. There is a lot to learn from them, and I look forward to the ways that they will be lead the church into the future.

My goal this year has been to be open to new possibilities, and they continue to present themselves before our faith community. I appreciate all who have been sounding boards and helped me dream about the new possibilities of what the church can be. This year has stretched me to using my gifts in new ways, and I am excited to see what the future holds for our congregation as God continues to use us in ways that we never could have asked for or imagined.

Little Blessings 2023 -2024 School Year Report:

After 25 years Little Blessings is maintaining a full preschool and Kindergarten program with 220 students and 45 staff. Staff share that the students, teacher teaming, planning meaningful lessons and seeing growth in students fulfills them in their profession. The evolution of the Early Childhood profession over the past 5 years has provided Little Blessings with grant support so that we can continue to expand our Resource Department to provide teacher coaching, parent support, student support services for development and enhance our learning environments with new materials as well as new carpet and flooring.

There is a lot to celebrate:

- It was Little Blessings' 25th Anniversary in August. A fun community event with food trucks, entertainment and a train kicked off the school year.
- Little Blessings currently have 92 students receiving Universal Preschool Funding through a state initiative. The goal behind this initiative is to offer equal opportunity for 4 year olds to receive a minimum of one year of preschool prior to their Kindergarten start as a preparation for school success in elementary school.
- The Resource Department supports over 80 families and students to connect them with development resources and therapists, community resources and coaching. In addition, this department provides teacher coaching and student support in the classrooms.
- Full Time Care continues to be supported through year round and full day programming.
- Partnerships with PUMC continue to expand with Blessing of the Backpacks, Children's Ministry outreach, Spark Worship during school hours lead by Ms. Noelle, VBS, guest readers and more.
- Finally, Little Blessings has been blessed with grant money and fundraising from the parent body to complete storage and flooring projects for the shared space in the church. In the future any funds received will go towards playground improvements.

Little Blessings is blessed to have a welcoming space at PUMC to provide programming for parents and students. As a mission of the church Little Blessings strives to continue to hold high quality care through the Colorado Shines rating and provide a faith based early education program that ignites an excitement for learning for students while preparing them for elementary school success. Thank you for the continued support!

Noelle Allison, Director of Children and Families

2023 has been an exciting year! Children's Ministry is growing every week! We have expanded our Sunday School classes and still offer a weekly online video.

Weekly Sunday School:

Provide a weekly meaningful experience for children nursery through 6th grade to learn about God's Great Big Love.

Online Sunday School:

Create, record, and edit a weekly online version and upload to YouTube.

Preschool Worship:

Twice a month preschool classes meet with Ms. Noelle to learn all bout God's great big love by introducing basic faith concepts in a way that is fun and developmentally appropriate for young children.

Moms Group:

Host a weekly mom's group for moms of all ages.

Preteens:

Children in grades 4th – 6th meet once a month to play games, make new friends, eat snacks and learn to share God's love with others.

Third Grade Bibles:

Every fall we gather all third graders (and kids who are older if they didn't receive a Bible in third grade) and teach them all about the Bible. On September 24th during worship the third graders received a Bible.

Children's Choir:

We have a group of kids meet each Sunday to learn new songs, meets friends and sing in church once a month. This year the children have been learning to play the ukulele!

Acolyte Training:

In the Spring children in third grade and older can learn how to bring the light of Jesus into worship. This training gives children the opportunity to serve the church.

Children's Ministry Special Events

Lent Family Activity:

The Family Activity was given with a weekly conversation starter for families to prepare for Easter.

Praying Through Holy Week:

A fun filled family event where children experienced hands on activities and learned new ways to pray plus the journey Jesus took thorough Holy Week

VBS:

The largest outreach program, 165 children from the church and community registered for this weeklong event. Kids went to small groups to learn all about God's great big love!

P.R.A.Y. Class for Scouts!

Two classes that both Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts can participate in. It's a religious program offered through P.R.A.Y. (Programs of Religious Activities for Youth) teaching young people to develop a deeper relationship with God and to understand how God is active in their lives and in the world around them. The classes are "God and Me" for 2nd and 3rd graders and "God and Family" for 4th , 5th and 6th graders.

Trunk-or-Treat:

We welcome families all over the Parker area to dress up in costumes, decorate a trunk and mingle with friends and families while the kids trick-or-treat, play games, and make crafts. Journey through

Chili Cook Off and Pumpkin Carving:

We had a great time sampling many different flavors of chili and macaroni and cheese while connecting with others! In the Fellowship Hall people of all ages carved pumpkins or decorated them with paint pens. A big thank you for all who made chili to help feed the crowd!

Advent:

Family Night with fun family activities, crafts and stories to get you ready for Christmas!

Santa and his Reindeer Games:

Takes pictures with Santa plus lots of games the whole family could play!

Church Potluck:

After the fabulous Messiah presentation people gathered to celebrate the season in a fun way! Everyone brought their favorite dish to share and stayed to visit with friends in our fun community space.

Live Nativity Story:

Children of all ages are invited to be part of the Christmas Eve worship service. The kids tell the story while dressing up at the characters. The children end with a song.

Christmas Eve Activities:

Following the Christmas Eve services children are encouraged to decorate cookies for Santa and explore the crafts and activities provided.

Paul iJames, Music and Fine Arts

As Music and Fine Arts Ministry approaches a close to another year of song and music, we would like you to join us in celebrating the following items from this ministry area: Live music is provided during all of our worship services. Music includes both soloists and instrumentalists. Live evening concerts at PUMC have been a great way to connect with our community! We have continued to provide Inspirational and joyous music every Sunday from our Hand Bells, Soloists, Cambiata Singers, Chorale and Collaboration with Kids Choir! The excitement of being together created the addition of new members to our choir and musical groups!

We were able to prepare for another beautiful community presentation of Handel's Messiah to ignite the Season of Advent. We capitalized on the talents of our instrumental musicians within our church to play beautiful piano duets, piano four hands and organ/piano duets. Soloists contributed their time and talents to make beautiful music on Sunday mornings and during special services throughout the year. We enjoy meaningful fellowship among the members of our choirs and musical groups creating a "familiarity and family". We also are gaining a deeper understanding of living with the Spirit and its influence through the practice of worship.

Show up and Sing Choir was well attended throughout the Summer months! We extended an invitation to the congregation to come and join our praise to God! We are a beautiful and inspiring ministry that

strives to serve each person in this blessed congregation. People in this ministry so selflessly lend a hand to help and assist any other ministry area in this church at a moment's notice. Fine Arts members are so committed to keeping our music library organized and detailed, serving with a mission of grace and purpose.

Our Fine Arts ministry staff and participants have brought their talent and gracious spirits to add to weekly worship. We are passionate about people and how music brings us together in the Spirit!

Kurt Bokenkamp and Jason Anderson - Audio/Media

Communication of church services, events, highlights and recaps to both our in person and online communities, as well as reaching new people outside of our current membership, is the primary role of the media department. The last year has came with some big changes.

Jason transitioned from a full time staff member to a smaller hourly role in January of this year. Many others, both staff and volunteers, have stepped in *and* stepped up to ensure that everyone who wants to receive timely, accurate communication of all the wonderful services, ministries and opportunities to be a part of here at Parker UMC get those communications through a variety of media.

Pastor Laura has been helping with the Midweek, printing bulletins and helping with other jobs when our volunteers are out of town. Pastor Cody is managing and posting to all of our social media. Noelle Allison has been printing and cutting promotional materials and Sarah Blankman has been doing all of these things as well as many of the technical aspects of the media department.

Susan Gustin edits our weekly Midweek Message, backs up our presentation computer, and sets up our weekly stream at umcparker.online.church. Susan Pearson has been very helpful printing, cutting and folding bulletins, flyers, and handouts.

The Audio Systems team, headed by Kurt Bokenkamp, and the Media Department have been working together to create meaningful experiences for the people at Parker UMC. We continue to add thoughtful and interesting elements to the sanctuary stage to enhance and reinforce the message series and liturgical seasons. A new group of talented volunteers are sharing their time on our Worship Decorating team. As you read this the wonderful Advent decorations you are seeing here in our sanctuary are a result of their commitment to Parker UMC.

We continue to perfect our video ministry by faithfully streaming the Sunday service each week, as well as support the pastors with any special video presentations. Video services are available for other services and groups who have members who cannot attend—a good example is memorial services. We offer A/V support throughout our campus for any groups requesting support. Kurt Bokenkamp and myself continue trying to grow our volunteer team running slides, audio board and cameras on Sunday mornings. Although we have a very faithful and knowledgeable volunteer team it is comprised of a handful of individuals. We really need more folks to join this team to give our current volunteers some well deserved breaks!

We continue to strive to do the best for our Parker UMC congregation. Thank you all for your continued support and encouragement!

Finance Update

Your financial gifts to the church so far in 2023 are very close to the amount that was budgeted, and with a close eye on expenditures this year, our total expenses are also running very close to budget. Consequently, we are using less of our surplus funding (the COVID-inspired Paycheck Protection Program funds) than we budgeted - funds we received during the 2020 and 2021 COVID years. In short, we are able to continue maintaining our healthy "rainy-day reserve" fund. Our financial challenge in 2024 will be to balance the need to maintain prudent financial reserves with our call to be in ministry to the world.

We continue to keep all payments – mortgage, salaries, other expenses - fully paid every month. As we build our budget for 2024, we again expect next year to be financially tight, but it will continue to be our mission, when combined with your prayers and gifts, to provide a variety of ministries to the local, regional and global world – to live into being a beacon of Christ-centered hope for our neighbors.

Building and Grounds Update

There has been a lot of work around the church building this year. Here are a few updates:

- -The summer rain revealed several leaks across the building. Peak Roofing has made several repairs on our flat roofs.
- -Several classrooms, including the youth room, had water intrusion with the heavy rains. We worked with Little Blessings to schedule the repairs in order to make sure the classrooms affected will continue to follow licensing guidelines.
- -Our sprinkler system had a leak that was finally repaired.

Many thanks to those who volunteered to take care of our lawn, our rock beds, and our parking lots. We are grateful for all you did in the hot summer sun!

We are grateful as well for those who have volunteered as "on-call" helpers when we have minor repair work. We couldn't do it without you!



Accountable Reimbursement Policy

The Parker United Methodist Church ("Church") recognizes that certain expenses of ministry paid by the pastor are part of the ordinary and necessary costs of ministry in this Church. Accordingly, we hereby establish an accountable reimbursement policy to defray them directly. The reimbursement account shall be an annual line item in the Church budget. It shall be in addition to the pastor's annual salary and housing. The reimbursement account for 2024 shall be \$3,000.00.

The following requirements for the policy are binding upon the Church and upon Rev. Laura Easter Rainwater, its senior pastor.

Accordingly, the Church hereby establishes an accountable reimbursement policy, pursuant to IRS regulations and upon the following terms and conditions:

- 1. The pastor shall be reimbursed from the reimbursement account for her ordinary, necessary and reasonable business expenses incurred in the conduct of the ministry for, and on behalf of, the Church. The following expenses are budgeted in this accountable reimbursement policy, as suggested for the work needs of the pastor.
- 2. The committee on SPR Chair or treasurer (as designated by the Church) must be given an adequate accounting within 60 days after the expense is paid or incurred. The adequate accounting shall include, but not be limited to, a statement of expenses, account-book diary or other similar record showing the amount, date, place, business purpose, and business relationship involved. Such documentation shall include receipts for all items of \$75 or more. Appropriate documents, cash receipts, canceled checks, credit card sales slips, and contemporaneous records (for those non-receipt expenses less than \$75), must be attached to each expense report. A log of total miles per day and enumeration of their general purpose shall suffice to substantiate automobile mileage, but under no circumstances will commuting mileage between the pastor's home and Church office be reimbursed. Copies of the documentary evidence and expense report shall be retained by both the pastor and the Church.

The committee on SPR Chair or treasurer shall be responsible for approving the expense. The committee on SPR Chair or treasurer shall exercise his/her discretion regarding the adequacy of the substantiation and appropriateness of any reimbursement. Questions arising in these areas will be resolved by the SPR Chair or treasurer, subject to the review and approval of the committee on SPR or committee on finance.

- 3. It is the intention of this policy that reimbursements will be paid <u>after</u> the expense has been incurred by the pastor. However, should circumstances require payment of an advance for any particular anticipated expense, the pastor must account for the expense as described above and return any excess reimbursement within 120 days after the expense is paid or incurred. Any excess advance must be returned to the Church before any additional advances are provided to the pastor.
- 4. Budgeted amounts not spent must not be paid as a salary bonus or other personal compensation. If such payments are made, the entire amount of the accountable reimbursement policy account will be taxable income to the pastor. The Church will be required by law to report that amount as part of the pastor's compensation. Disposition of

any unspent balances remains at the discretion of the committee on SPRC and/or committee on finance in building the budget for the next year.

5. It is understood by the various parties that all elements of this resolution must be carefully followed to prevent the Church from being required by regulation to include all reimbursements as income on the pastor's Form W-2. The primary responsibility in this regard is on the pastor to report and adequately account for her expenses to the committee on SPR chair and treasurer.
